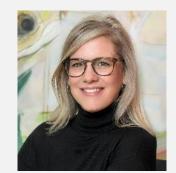

Closely aligns with the University Strategic Plan

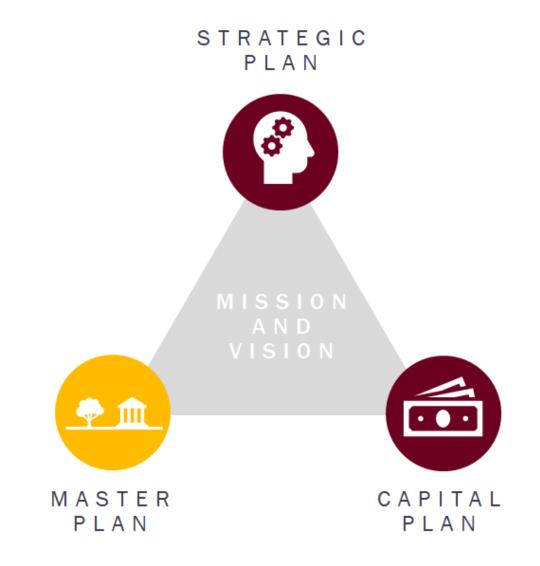
so that it supports current priorities

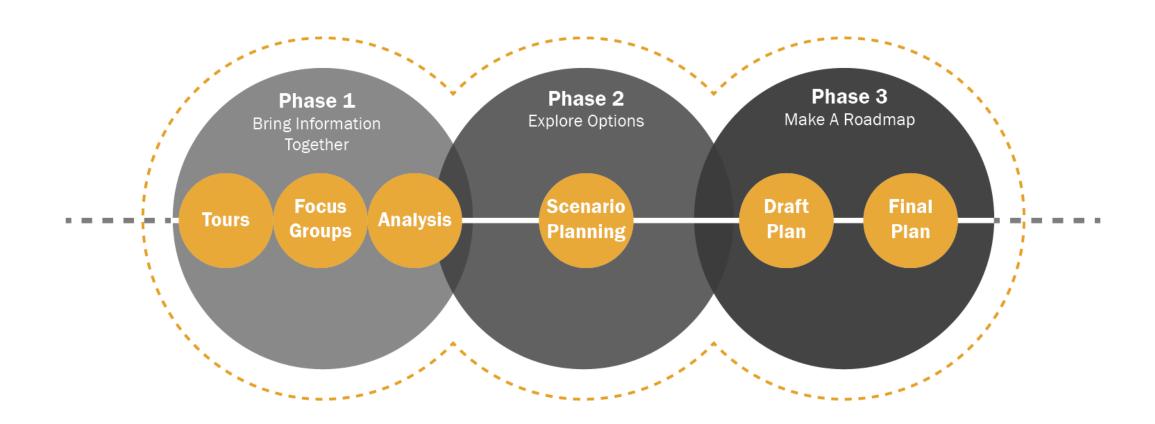
Think strategically and long-term.

KEY PROJECTS

Campus Edges

At the campus edge, College development interfaces with the surrounding neighborhoods. The Citadel Real Estate Foundation has prepared an edge plan that proposes five potential public-private partnership development projects, which are all integrated into the Master Plan.

Dunnemann Avenue

Along Dunnemann Avenue, Citadel property can be developed into additional housing for faculty and staff or potentially for community members.

East Stands

Alongside the completion of the visitor stands on the east side of Johnson Hagood Stadium, there is capacity to develop an office building.

G City Gym Parking Lot Redevelopment

The City Gym parking lot sits adjacent to the WestEdge development and has significant redevelopment potential for mixed-use development and structured parking. The planned uses for this site should be complementary to the campus environment and community, and the College should seek agreements to have access to structured parking facilities in some capacity.

Landfill Site

The landfill site adjacent to Joseph P.
Riley Jr., Park and Brittlebank Park has
significant potential as a mixed-use
development opportunity. Due to floodzone regulations, construction on this site
will require extra consideration.

College Park

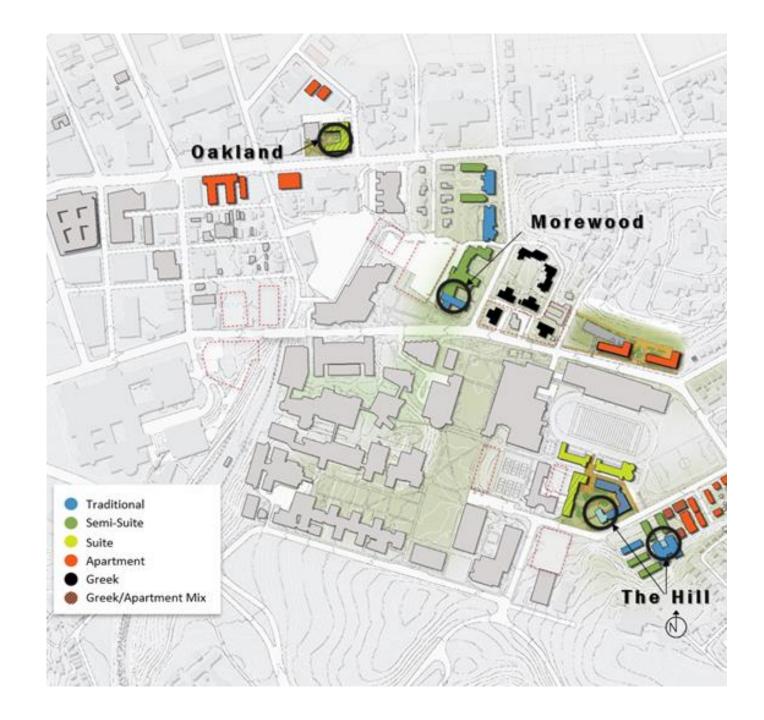
The College Park field currently serves The Citadel's baseball team, and it is difficult to accommodate a baseball field elsewhere on College property. In the future, however, there may be opportunities for mixed-use development on this site in partnership with the City of Charleston.

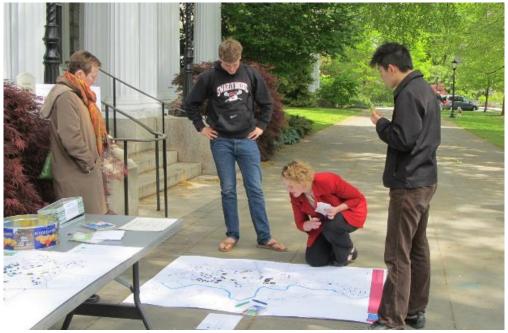
