PORTFOLIO INSTRUCTIONS Spring 2019 portfolio instructions

In the senior seminar class (ENVS 490) each program soon-to-be graduate will be asked to pull together samples of their best work within the environmental program at Winthrop. Discuss this with your academic advisor, but be sure to keep electronic copies of all of your papers and projects in classes that support the ENVS program.

ADVICE ABOUT INTERNSHIPS AND UNDERGRADUATE RESEARCH PROJECTS

An experiential learning experience (internships, research project with a faculty member, or an extended service project) is required for ENSC and ENST majors. They often serve as stepping-stones to employment and entry into professional careers.

Students must make their own arrangements for these experiences, but be sure to start early and to consult with the environmental program chair. Leads may come from your advisor, the Center for Career and Civic Engagement, or your own network of acquaintances; start early, be persistent, and consult with the ENVS program chair once you think you have a good opportunity. You will then need to register for ENVS 461, 462, 463, 470 or 495. If you are doing an internship, you will need to develop a learning agreement in consultation with your site supervisor and the ENVS program chair. You will also keep a log of your work and write a final reflective paper, but be sure to consult your syllabus. If you are doing a research project, your faculty mentor will have specific requirements that often include presenting a poster at a research symposium on campus.

DALTON SCHOLARSHIP

The Environmental Sciences and Studies program is pleased to announce the availability of the Dalton Undergraduate Scholarship. The scholarship is made possible by the vision and generosity of Harry and 'Becca Dalton to support the students committed to investigation of environmental issues and the promotion of environmental responsibility and sustainability. This scholarship is **designed for rising juniors or seniors who are environmental science (ENSC) or studies (ENST) majors**.

Students will be notified by email of application availability with an **early March deadline each year**. Information will be collected via a Qualtrics survey and reviewed by a faculty committee.

SUMMER UNDERGRADUATE FELLOWSHIP

The Margaret E. Spencer Summer Undergraduate Fellowship is designed for rising juniors or seniors to conduct substantive summer projects (research, service, internship, or similar) that will help them become experts in their subject areas or gain experience working in an environmental field. These awards are available only to Environmental Sciences or Environmental Studies majors so long as they are conducting an environmental research project, participating in an environmental internship, or conducting an environmentally relevant service project. Consult the ENVS program director for more information.

Examples of how funds might be used include, but are not limited to, the following:

Summer pay for a research project with your favorite faculty member

Pay for an internship that might otherwise be unpaid.

Costs for supplies and travel related to a community service project.

Travel costs for commuting to an internship.
