Prenderò quel brunettino

Dorabella and Fiordiligi, two upper-class sisters, are engaged to Ferrando and Guglielmo. A cynical bachelor, Don Alonso, bets the two young men that since "all women are like that" (i.e., fickle), their fiancées would quickly change their minds if properly wooed by two "stangers." He convinces Ferrando and Guglielmo to disguise themselves as Albanian soldiers and each seems to be successful in gaining the affections of the other sister, at least, so it appears. In this duet, in the absence of their fiancés, the sisters decide to explore possibilities with the strangers.

Premier trouble

This text is full of passion for a mysterious forbidden romance.

Divin sommeil

This song illustrates the story of the birth of Jesus. It describes the sleeping infant being watched over by angels and Mary. The faster-moving end of the piece details the waking of the baby and the light that He brings to the world.

La Japonaise
