Program Notes:

Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750) - Partita in A Minor, BWV 1031 for Flute

Bach's Partita in A Minor for flute, BWV 1031, is a gem in the Baroque flute repertoire. Composed in the early 18th century, this work is a suite of dance movements typical of the period. The four movements – Allemande, Corrente, Sarabande, and Bourrée Anglaise – showcase Bach's masterful use of counterpoint and intricate ornamentation. The Partita unfolds with a graceful and expressive dialogue on the flute, demonstrating Bach's profound understanding of both the technical and emotive capabilities of the instrument.

Albert Roussel (1869-1937) - Joueurs de flûte, Op. 27

Albert Roussel's Joueurs de Flute is a captivating piece that explores the diverse tonal palette of the flute. Composed in 1924, this four-movement work is a showcase of Roussel's impressionistic and neo-Classical influences. The movements, titled "Pan," "Tityre," "Krishna," and "Mr de la Péjaudie," are inspired by mythological figures and feature virtuosic passages that highlight the

flute's agility and expressiveness. Roussel's Joueurs de Flute is a testament to the composer's innovative approach to composition and his ability to create vivid sonic landscapes.

Cécile Chaminade (1857-1944) - Concertino for Flute and Piano, Op. 107

Cécile Chaminade, a prominent French composer of the late 19th and early 20th centuries, contributed significantly to the flute repertoire with her charming Concertino for Flute and Piano. Composed in 1902, this one-movement work is a delightful blend of lyrical melodies and virtuosic passages. Chaminade's Concertino is characterized by its expressive lyricism, brilliant ornamentation, and a seamless interplay between the flute and piano. The piece unfolds with elegance and showcases Chaminade's melodic ingenuity, making it a staple in the flute repertoire.
