Department of Fine Arts - Anne Fiala

Arts in Basic Curriculum Project - Christine Fisher

The ABC Project is celebrating its 30th anniversary this year!

As a part of the celebration, the ABC Project is hosting Dr. Earl Franks as a keynote speaker for the ABC Peer-to-Peer conference on February 8, 2018. Dr. Franks was a music major and a band teacher, before going into administration. He says public school music made him the person he is today! He is now the Executive Director of the National Association of Elementary School Principals, (NAESP). We are thrilled to feature Dr. Franks as our keynote speaker. The conference will also feature ABC principals as session presenters. Because of Dr. Franks national relevance, the event is free for any principal interested in arts education. It will be held at the SC Department of Archives and History located at 8301 Parklane Road in Columbia., SC. If you are interested in attending the event, or know of a principal who would like to attend, please content Kim Wilson or myself. (Christine Fisher)

The SC House voted 101-9 Jan. 9, 2018 to override Veto #24. This decision resulted in a \$350,000 budget increase to the SC Arts Commission. The entire amount returns to SC Arts Councils across the state for general operating support.

The SC Senate will vote on Tuesday, Jan 16, 2028 on the Vetoes. If you aren't already a member of the SC Arts Alliance, please consider joining to stay up-to-date on legislative issues that impact Arts and Arts Education.

The SC Education Oversight Committee approved and placed in their budget recommendations to the SC Legislature of an additional \$500,000 to the SC Arts Commission for arts education. This is the first step in the funding process. If approved by House and Senate, it will allow additional funds for smaller arts education grants for teachers, and for schools and districts to apply to become ABC Sites. For the first time in the history of the ABC Project, we cannot add ABC Sites unless additional money is provided by the legislature.

Finally, ABC Project has a new Field Services Specialist, a position currently held by Kathe Stanley. Kim Wilson returns to Winthrop University after graduating in 1992. Since that time, she has earned an MFA in Ceramics at Kent State University, a MAT from University of Arkansas at Monticello and is currently working towards her Ed.D in Teacher Leadership from Walden University. She has numerous experiences as an artist and educator span across community education centers such as Shelburne Craft School in Vermont, Pewabic Pottery in Michigan, and Sawtooth School for Visual Art in North Carolina, higher education teaching University of Arkansas at Monticello and K-12 public education. In

fact, Kim was recognized as the 2012 Arkansas Teacher of the Year. Combined, her experiences and passion for arts education made her the perfect fit for ABC Project's mission.
