Advising at Winthrop

- ❖ Designated advising period to ensure students meet with advisors and have advising flag removed
- ❖ Students should make appointments before advising begins. Some areas have group advising. Students should arrive prepared for advising appointment.
- ❖ Winthrop University Undergraduate Catalog:
“All students are responsible for the proper completion of their academic programs... Students should secure guidance from an advisor, but the final responsibility remains that of the student.”

Degree Requirements

- ❖ Minimum of 120* hours required for graduation / 40 above 299
- ❖ 2.0 cumulative GPA required for good standing and graduation
- ❖ All students must meet the Constitution requirement
- ❖ A minor is required for the Bachelor of Arts degree
- ❖ Students apply for graduation upon having 35-37 remaining hours

Issues

- ❖ Some General Education courses have pre-requisites
 - You must meet pre-requisite requirements before enrolling in a course
- ❖ Considered same designator:
 - [ARTT, ARTS, and ARTE] [DANT, DANA] [MUSA, MUST] [THRT, THRA]
- ❖ Natural Science
 - Must have one lab science (usually 4 hrs.)
 - If two courses taken, must have two different categories represented
- ❖ Versatile courses!
 - ARTH 175, HIST 111...
 - Meet requirements for Historical Perspectives, Global Perspectives, and Humanities and Arts
 - May count in only **ONE** category

Course Withdrawals



- ❖ Students may withdraw from a course online unless they have a hold on their account. If they have a hold they must submit course withdrawal form to Records and Registration, 126 Tillman.
- ❖ When a student withdraws from a course he/she will receive a grade of “N” which means, “No Grade.” An N does not affect GPA, but may impact financial aid.
- ❖ Thursday, December 3rd - Last day to withdraw from a *full* semester course for the fall semester.

Satisfactory/Unsatisfactory (S/U)

May S/U a total of 5 courses:

- ❖ S = C- or above (B or above for Honors courses)
- ❖ U = D+ or below (B- or below for Honors courses)
- ❖ Courses offered only on an S/U basis are not included
- ❖ Allowed 1 S/U per semester; first-time freshman allowed 2 in the first semester
- ❖ Students should consult their advisor about appropriate application
 - Interest/ major/ GPA protection

Repeat Exemptions

- Any course (Winthrop or transferred) may be repeated except courses with a grade of B or higher or a grade of S.
- Repeat Exemption applies only to courses taken and retaken at Winthrop.
- Students may use the repeat exemption option 4 times in their academic career. The number of exemptions allowed is prorated for transfer students.

Repeat Exemptions



- New grade replaces old grade
- Original grade exempted from GPA calculation
- After maximum repeats; grades are averaged

Students should talk with Financial Aid about
Satisfactory Academic Progress.


Incomplete



- ❖ Incomplete “I” – used only as a prefix to a letter grade (Ex. IF, ID)
- ❖ Incomplete indicates that the course has not been completed for a valid reason
- ❖ Course may be completed at the discretion of the instructor
- ❖ Incompletes only last one year
 - If the course is not completed within a year, the IF converts to an F; IC to a C
- ❖ Incompletes do not affect GPA until “I” is removed
- ❖ Grades may be changed through Wingspan



Cultural Events

- ❖ Graduation Requirement
- ❖ 3 events for every 20 hours taken at Winthrop
- ❖ New freshmen – 18 events 
- ❖ Transfers – 3 for every 20 hours needed to reach 120 hours, minimum 4 events*
- ❖ May petition to receive credit for off-campus events

*124 hours required for catalog years 2014 and earlier

- ❖ ACAD 101 (if required and not completed)
- ❖ WRIT 101, HMXP 102, or CRTW 201
- ❖ Other General Education courses
- ❖ Major courses
- ❖ Minor courses (if appropriate)



Advising: Information

- ❖ Interim grades (discuss S/U, course repeats if appropriate)

- ❖ For advisees on academic probation (below 2.0)
 - ❖ 2.0 cumulative GPA to return to good standing
 - ❖ 2.0 semester GPA to continue next term
 - ❖ Students continuing on probation limited to 15 hours

- ❖ Advising Flag:
 - ❖ After advising each student, go to “Advise Students” in Wingspan
 - ❖ Select Spring 2021 and remove flag so student can register





Advising: Possible Questions

- ❖ How do I get Winthrop credit for courses I take at another school?
- ❖ How do I get Winthrop credit for study abroad courses?
- ❖ I want to increase my GPA by repeating a course. Can I repeat the course at another school?
- ❖ I need to earn 30 hours this year for my scholarship. If I take summer classes, will they count toward those hours?
- ❖ Can my mom call you about my grades?
