A Welcome from Dean Karen Oremus

Dear ArtsWinthrop Community,

Welcome to the 2025–2026 academic year! The College of Visual and Performing Arts enters this year with energy, momentum, and deep gratitude for our faculty and staff, students, alumni, and our campus and community partners who champion our work.

MOMENTUM. We welcome 260+ new first-year and transfer students. CVPA enrollment has grown 12%

over three years; from Fall '23 to Fall '24, the Bachelor of Design posted the largest undergraduate growth at Winthrop (+30.2%). External recognition mirrors this rise: **Niche ranks Winthrop #1 in South Carolina in Performing**

Arts, with ArtsWinthrop programs in the top 3% nationally. Students come to Winthrop for hands-on learning, close mentorship, and a creative culture tied to real audiences and industry.

FACULTY EXCELLENCE. Alongside our dedicated roster of practicing artists, designers, musicians, dancers, actors, and scholars, we welcome four new full-time and seven part-time colleagues (profiled in this issue).

COMMUNITY & OUTREACH. Last year we delivered 171 community events; 15 workshops reached 2,015 prospective students; Summer Institutes served 331 attendees. The ABC Institute hosted 14 events, engaging 6,000+ educators and positively impacting 37,800+ K-12 students across 17 SC districts. We're on pace to exceed these totals—keep an eye on our calendars for concerts, productions, exhibitions, lectures and showcases. Your presence in our audiences is a powerful form of support and encouragement.

ACADEMIC INNOVATION. A university-wide task force finalized the interdisciplinary B.A. in Game Design, launching this academic year. **Winthrop's new Virtual Reality Lab and renovated Music Technology studios** (profiled in this issue) will expand opportunities for learning and research.

FACILITIES & PHILANTHROPY. The historic <u>Byrnes Auditorium</u> reopened this spring. Explore it's renovated <u>Byrnes Reception/ Exhibition Hall</u> on the second floor, made possible by Charlie Wofford and Nancy (Thomas) Wofford '67; their support also established a **gallery archive room** to house their gifted **Juliet McIver Art Collection**, which students will research this fall, culminating in a public exhibition and publication. **A new Piano Lab**—funded by generous alumni and friends—elevates musicianship and pedagogy. The Class of '75 is supporting the **Byrnes Lighting Project.** Murray and Hazel Somerville (Hazel, Music '69) established the **Dr. David Lowry Endowment** for Organ Education in honor of Professor Emeritus Dr. Lowry. We also launch the 5,000-sq-ft **J. Robert Bazemore Design Center** at <u>The Thread</u>, named for alumnus J. Robert "Bob" Bazemore '85 (full feature inside).

We continue to receive support from our alumni who give back to their alma mater and our community of generous supporters to our college and department excellence funds. Every contribution—financial, in-kind, time or presence—amplifies our mission and directly impacts our students.



J. Robert Bazemore Design Center at The Thread!

This 5,000-square-foot, state-of-the-art learning space—named in honor of alumnus J. Robert "Bob" Bazemore '85—features five modern classrooms, advanced technology, and inspiring design elements that connect students directly to real-world practices. It also places Winthrop's Interior Design program—the only program in South Carolina fully accredited by the Council for Interior

Design Accreditation—in the heart of a thriving community hub.

The center sits inside <u>The Thread</u>, a redevelopment of the former Baxter Mill building, once the largest textile printing and finishing center in the world under one roof. Today, this historic transformation reflects how education, industry, and community continue to weave the fabric of York County together.

Special thanks to Bob Bazemore '85, the Winthrop Foundation Board, and Family Trust Credit Union for their partnership, vision, and generosity in making this milestone a reality.

We're excited to see this space shape the next generation of designers while strengthening the ties between Winthrop and our community.

Winthrop Interior Design Center – Reflections and Intent

"This project has been one of the most meaningful of my career because it brings together everything I value: design, education, and community. I believe that design has the power to shape how people learn, think, and collaborate. Investing my time and talents into a space that will directly inspire and prepare the next generation of designers feels like a natural way to give back to the university that helped launch me.

The Winthrop Interior Design Center was conceived with a clear parti: a minimalist, modern environment where the architecture recedes, and the work of students becomes the color, texture, and animation of the space. The palette is deliberately restrained with neutral tones, natural materials, and no accent walls. This decision was



at the forefront.

intentional, not a lack of design. By avoiding distraction, the walls and surfaces provide a blank canvas that invites students to project their creativity into the space. Their work, whether sketches, models, or installations, supplies the vibrancy, contrast, and depth.

The neutrality of the architecture ensures that the life of the space is constantly renewed by each generation of students. In this way, the Center becomes both a learning environment and an evolving gallery. The setting is flexible, timeless, and focused, allowing students to see their contributions as central to the experience of design. This approach connects back to the Bauhaus tradition, where Walter Gropius and later designers emphasized clarity, proportion, and honesty in materials. It also reflects Massimo Vignelli's canon of restraint and discipline, where simplicity becomes the highest form of elegance. Even the choice to name the center in lowercase letters, j robert bazemore design center, echoes that Bauhaus-inspired typographic humility, where the work rather than the ego stands

I plan to be present at the center several times each semester, both in lectures and in more informal mentoring settings. My talks will focus on areas where design intersects with business and culture, such as sustainability, product design, architectural interiors, branding, and the realities of building a design practice. I also want to share my experiences working with manufacturers and navigating the industry over decades.

The business of design has shifted dramatically since I began. When I started, design was often seen as an aesthetic layer applied at the end. Today it is integral to strategy, as companies recognize that design drives productivity, culture, and innovation. Technology has changed everything, from digital modeling to virtual collaboration, but the human side of design remains constant. Going forward, I see the profession becoming even more interdisciplinary, merging with fields such as sustainability, psychology, and technology.

To students, my advice is simple: build relationships because the design world is small and your reputation follows you. Stay curious and never stop learning new tools, materials, and perspectives. Understand the business side of design, because creativity must be supported by budgets, contracts, and execution. And do not be afraid to take risks and put your own stamp on your work.

During Phil Lader's administration, I was exposed to the Office of Campus Planning and Design, where he and his team led a major initiative to revitalize the Winthrop campus. That gave me real-world experience, actually working on projects and renovations while I was still a student. My portfolio ended up being filled not only with classroom assignments but also with professional-level work, which directly led to my first job at an architectural firm in Charlotte. The new center has that same potential. It can be a place where students gain hands-on, practical experience while developing the confidence and portfolios that will carry them into their careers.

What excites me most about the center is that it is not just a building, it is a platform. It is designed to evolve with students' creativity and to showcase their work as the true focal point.

My hope is that it becomes not only a hub for design education at Winthrop, but also a place where the broader community sees the value of design in shaping culture and daily life."





ArtsWinthrop and The
Department of Theatre and Dance
would like to take a moment to
honor a colleague, friend, and
long time dance faculty member
Sandra Neels, who passed away in
June after a remarkable career in
dance. Sandra joined Winthrop in
1990 and spent 35 years shaping and
inspiring our community. To honor her
legacy, this year's Fall Dance
Showcase will be dedicated to her
work and contributions.

"She was a leading dancer for Merce Cunningham, a prolific choreographer and an admired teacher. Viewed on film, dancing from more than 50

years ago tends to have a period quality, a certain quaintness. But films of the dancer and dance teacher Sandra Neels performing the revolutionary choreography of Merce Cunningham have not dated in the least. Tall, slender, long-limbed, self-possessed, conveying an innocence bordering on unworldly, Ms. Neels appears onscreen as if she were filmed only yesterday, a lone figure commanding space with hands and feet that are exceptionally articulate. She danced for Cunningham from 1963 to 1973, creating roles and solos that are still performed today. Later , she became a successful choreographer in her own right and a renowned teacher , and when she died recently at 85, she had been eminent in American dance for more than 60 years." 






The Department of Theatre and Dance will welcome DaMond LeMonte Garner for a residency from September 15-20.

Devin Waddell Assistant Professor of Design, Interior Design

Devin Waddell is an interior designer and educator with teaching and research interests in sensor-responsive spaces and human-centered parametric design. He is a member of several professional organizations, including IIDA, ASID, NCARB, and NOMA. His work has been featured in national exhibitions and competitions, including the 2020 COTE Top Ten Award for the "Up-Lift Technology Tower" and the 2024 Pave x FredMeyer Student Challenge.

Brian Bojanowski Adjunct professor of Fine Arts, Printmaking

Brian has spent the past 28 years as



an educator, with 24 of those years also dedicated to entrepreneurship and 11 as a practicing artist. Over the course of his career, he's had the joy of teaching thousands of students ranging in age from 2 to 19. As an artist, Brian—often known as Bojo—has pursued a variety of creative endeavors through his business, Bojo Print & Design. This venture specializes in creating merchandise for touring musicians, with a strong focus on design and the screenprinting of concert tour posters.



Sarah Abushakra Adjunct Faculty of Music, Piano

Sarah Abushakra is a pianist, teacher, and choral director from Myrtle Beach, SC. She recently taught piano and pedagogy at Coastal Carolina University and is active with MTNA at all levels. In addition to her academic work, she teaches privately and serves as Director of Music/Organist at St. Anne's Episcopal Church. She holds degrees from Coastal Carolina University and the University of Georgia.

Teil Taliesin Adjunct Faculty of Music, Oboe

Teil Taliesin is a classically trained oboist known for integrating looping pedals and effects into her



performances. She plays with ensembles like the Charlotte Symphony and Rock Hill Symphony and has performed at festivals worldwide. Teil co-founded Phoenix Down RPG and Burnt Reeds, creating immersive music experiences that blend classical music with gaming and diverse styles. She is also an active educator and advocate, with degrees from the Cleveland Institute of Music and the University of Louisville.



Johnnie Felder Adjunct Faculty of Music, Voice

Johnnie J. Felder, a tenor from Vance, South Carolina, holds degrees from Benedict College, the University of South Carolina, and earned his Doctor of Musical Arts in Vocal Performance in 2022. He has trained internationally in Austria and Bulgaria, where he made his European debut in Puccini's Gianni Schicchi. Known for his expressive range and lyricism, Felder has performed leading roles in operas by Donizetti and Mozart. He was a 2022 Spoleto Festival USA Vocal Fellow and has appeared in world premieres, including Omar and a Stevie Wonder tribute concert.

Amelia Binford Adjunct Faculty of Dance

Amelia has over 35 years of dance experience, holding a Bachelor's Degree in Dance Performance and



Dance Education Certification from Winthrop University. She has performed extensively, including tours with Dance Caravan, appearances with the Charlotte Philharmonic Orchestra, and roles in theater productions like A Chorus Line. Currently, Amelia is in her 18th year teaching Modern, Jazz, and Tap at Northwest School of the Arts, where she also choreographs and inspires students through her innovative work.



Lorraine Crittendon Adjunct Faculty of Dance

Lorraine Crittendon, a natural-born dancer, discovered her passion through neighborhood choreography and stepping before formally studying modern dance at UNC Charlotte. where she became the first in her family to attend a four-year university. Now a middle school dance educator in Charlotte-Mecklenburg Schools and a Teaching Artist with Charlotte Ballet, Lorraine has earned multiple teaching awards and founded the Charlotte Cultural Collective, a troupe focused on Afro-Diasporic dances. Drawing from her diverse training and experiences, she inspires students to embrace dance's rich cultural diversity and continually grow as both artists and learners.

James Kopecky Adjunct Faculty of Dance



Born and raised near Chicago, James trained in multiple dance styles before earning his BFA in Dance Performance from Butler University and joining Ballet San Jose, where he rose to Corps de Ballet and performed works by renowned choreographers. After five years, he joined Charlotte Ballet as a principal dancer, starring in leading roles in pieces by Dwight Rhoden, Jiri Kylian, Jerome Robbins, and more. Throughout his career, James has choreographed for several companies and was honored as a 2022 UBCI Choreographic Fellow, eager to create new works with talented dancers.


