<u>Recognizing</u> that indigenous peoples in South America face severe limitations on the fulfillment of fundamental social and economic human rights,

<u>Realizing</u> that between January and August of 2016, 51 indigenous children in Colombia alone perished due to causes associated with malnutrition,

<u>Understanding</u> that similar preventable deaths occur across the continent of South America each year,

Emphasizing the United Nation's Sustainable Development Goals established in 2015,

<u>Observing</u> that few efforts are taken to uplift indigenous displaced communities in South America,

<u>Believing</u> that increased protections for oppressed indigenous peoples of South America would lead to a decrease in unfair deaths and social and economic setbacks,

Calls For:

- 1. <u>Requests</u> that UN member states continue to pledge funds to meet the Sustainable Development Goals, including the goals of eradicating poverty and hunger, promoting good health and wellbeing, reducing inequalities, and the advancement of peace, justice, and strong institutions;
- 2. <u>Calls</u> for the use of a portion of the aforementioned funds to go into the creation of a subcommittee dedicated to the preservation of indigenous rights in South America;
- 3. Invites UN member states to send representatives to the aforementioned subcommittee;
- **4.** Recommends that representatives of the subcommittee create direct action benefitting indigenous peoples in South America through the creation of local resource offices throughout South American nations;
- 5. <u>Further Requests</u> that the implemented resource offices are available for indigenous peoples to seek financial advising, legal resources, and counseling regarding social injustices;
- **6.** Encourages the committee for South American indigenous advocacy to maintain the resource offices put into place in South American nations and to produce an annual report regarding the status of indigenous human rights in South America and detailing the work completed by the committee's offices.
